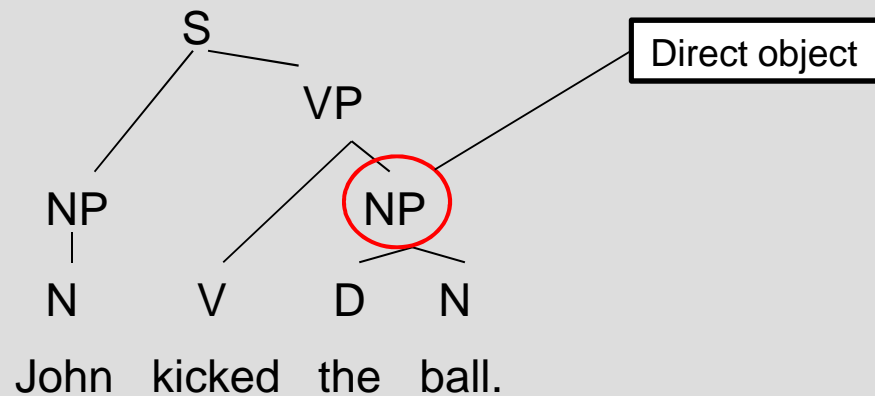

# Word classes

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Open class	Symbol	Examples
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Auxiliary	AUX	<i>have, be, will, do, be going to</i>
Pronoun	PRO	<i>I, you, he, that, what, somebody, any</i>
Determiner	Det	<i>the, a, some, which, that, my, all</i>

# V-0

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- (1) I really **hate** this class.
- (2) We **miss** you.
- (3) Could you please **help** me?
- (4) Peter want me to **leave** the house.

- ☐ Present tense
- ☐ Infinitive

# V-ed

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- (1) Peter **went** home.
- (2) They **left** Jena a while ago.
- (3) I wish I **knew** where she is.
- (4) If I **were** you I would leave now.

- ☐ Past tense
- ☐ Subjunctive

# V-s

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- (1) He likes his new house.
- (2) \*We hates this class.
- (3) When it rains, we will stay at home.
- (4) The train to London departs at 2pm.

- ☐ Present tense
- ☐ Agreement marker

# V-ing [present PTC]

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- (1) He is smiling.
- (2) He was smiling.
- (3) \*He is knowing this.

- ❑ Progressive **aspect**

- (4) Watching TV last night, Peter feel asleep.
- (5) The person working on this project left us yesterday.
- (6) Studying linguistics makes you happy.

- ❑ Adverbial participle
- ❑ Relative participle
- ❑ Gerund

# V-en [past PTC]

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(1) He has finished the assignment.

(2) She had told me this.

- ☐ [Present] Perfect

- ☐ [Past] Perfect

(3) The store is closed.

(4) My friend John was hit by a bus.

- ☐ Passive voice



# Verbs

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The different inflectional verb forms serve four primary functions:

- |   |           |                               |
|---|-----------|-------------------------------|
| ❑ | Tense     | Present - Past                |
| ❑ | Aspect    | Progressive – Non-progressive |
| ❑ | Agreement | Singular – Plural             |
| ❑ | Voice     | Active – Passive              |

# Auxiliaries

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There are two basic types of auxiliaries:

- ❑ Structural auxiliaries      be, have, do
- ❑ Modal auxiliaries      can, must, may

Structural auxiliaries can also be main verbs:

- (1) She is my friend.
- (2) She has no money.
- (3) John did this.

# Auxiliaries

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Modal verbs have two different uses:

- ❑ Deontic
- ❑ Epistemic

- (1) Since the light is on, he must be at home.
- (2) Sorry, but I can't help you.
- (3) May I come in?
- (4) You must not open the door.
- (5) This might be a mistake.

# Auxiliaries

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<b>Do</b>	does	did	doing	done

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The English auxiliaries have two distinct distributional properties:

- (1) She wasn't talking to us.
- (2) I can't hear you.

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The English auxiliaries have two distinct distributional properties:

(1) She **wasn't** **talk**ing to us.

(2) I **can't** **hear** you.

□ Postverbal negation

(3) Is she coming.

(4) Can you help me.

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(3) **Is** she coming.

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□ Subject-auxiliary inversion
