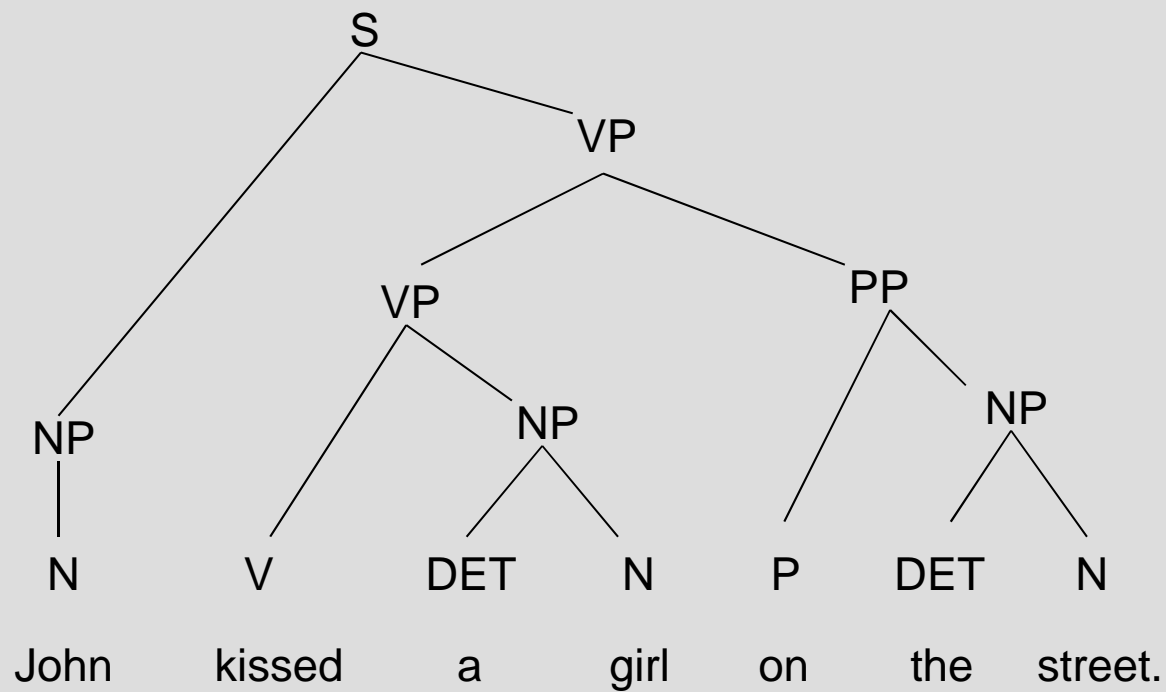


Phrases and phrasal categories

Syntactic structure is hierarchical.



Phrase structure tests

- Pronominalization

He kissed her (over) there.

- Movement

On the street John kissed the girl.

- Coordination

John kissed the girl and her friend on the street.

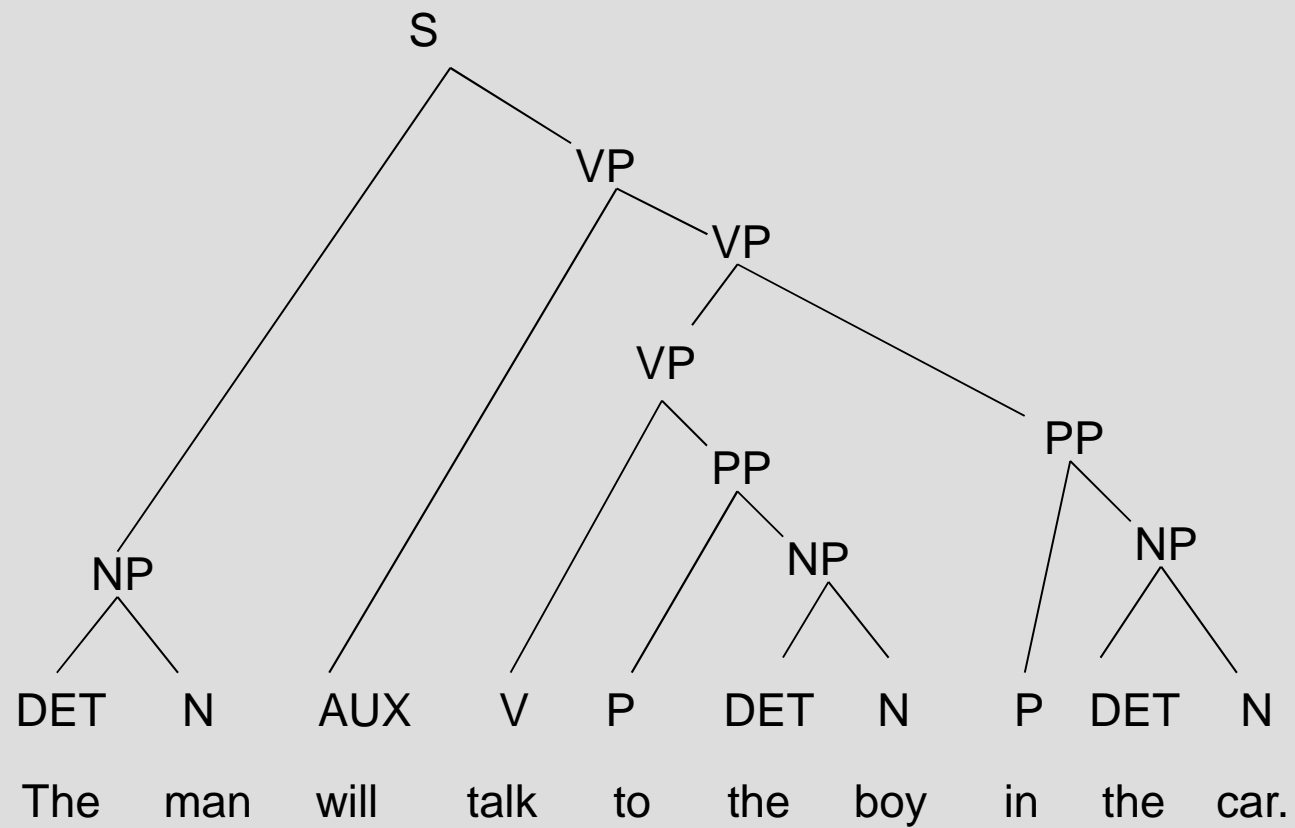
- Sentence fragment

Where did John kiss the girl? On the street.

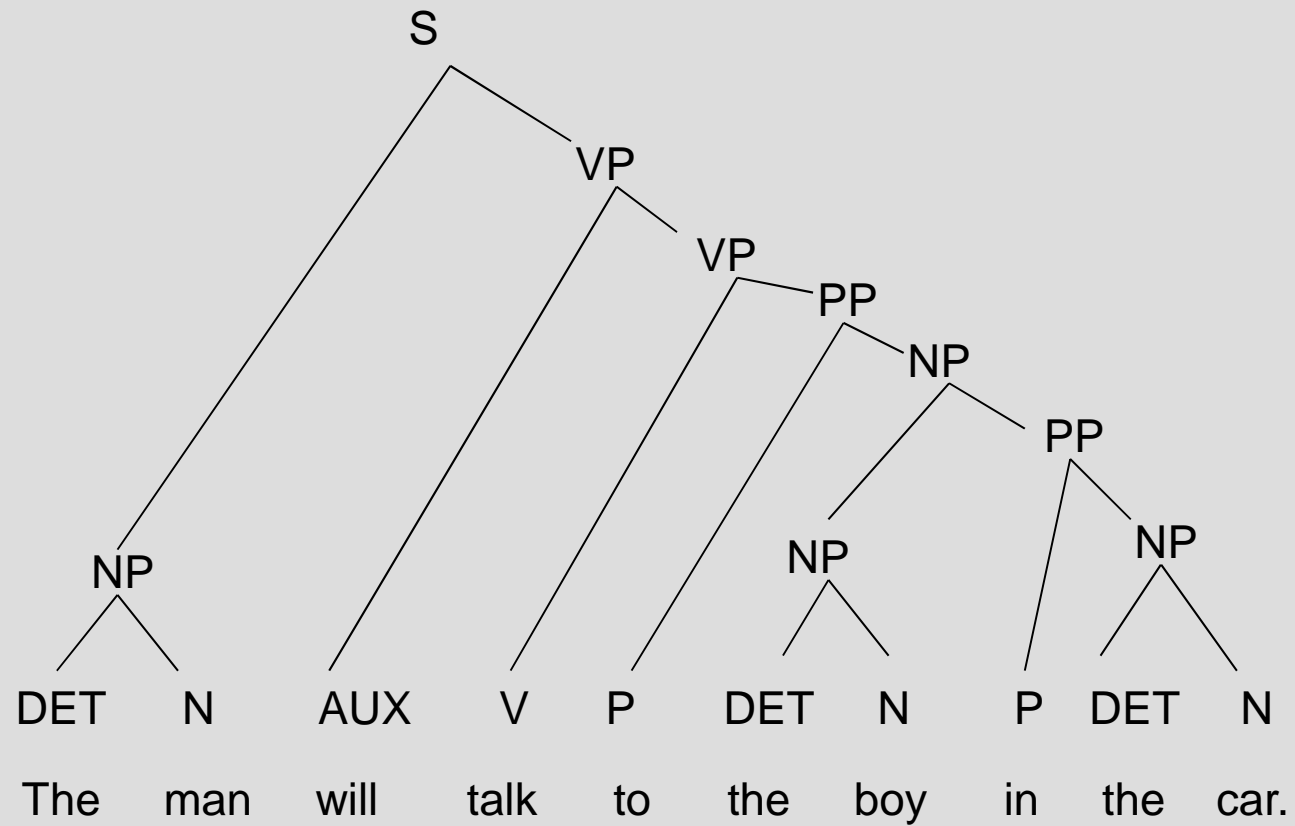
- Gapping

John kissed the girl on the street, did he __ ?

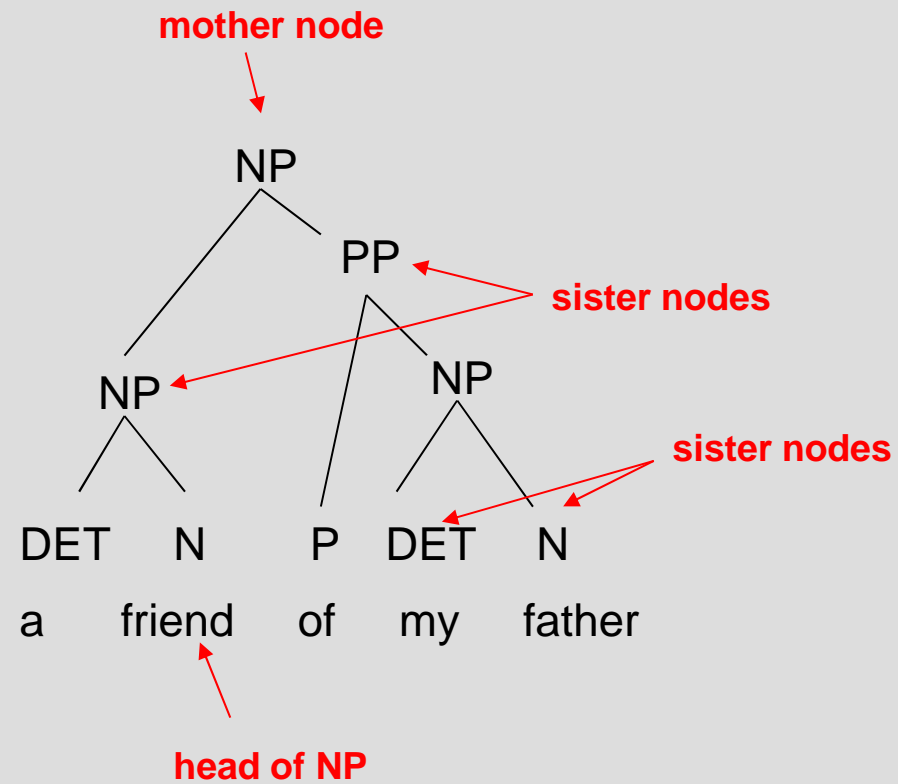

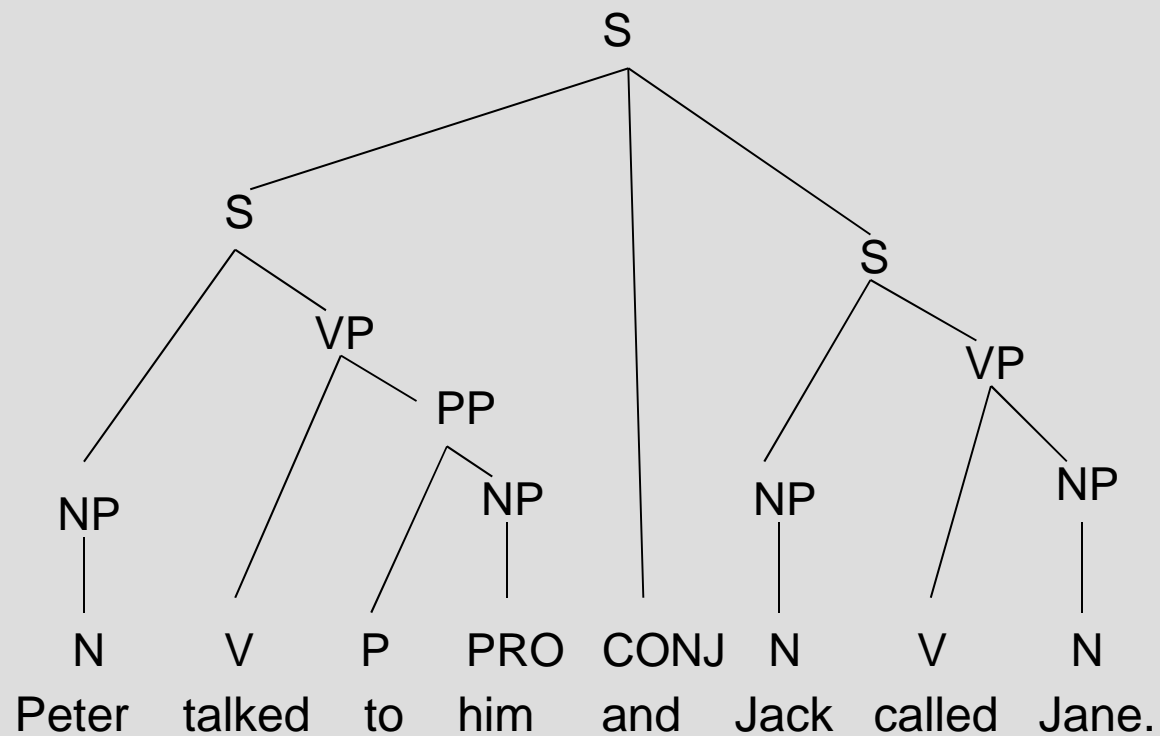
Draw tree diagrams

6. I believe that John gave me the ball.

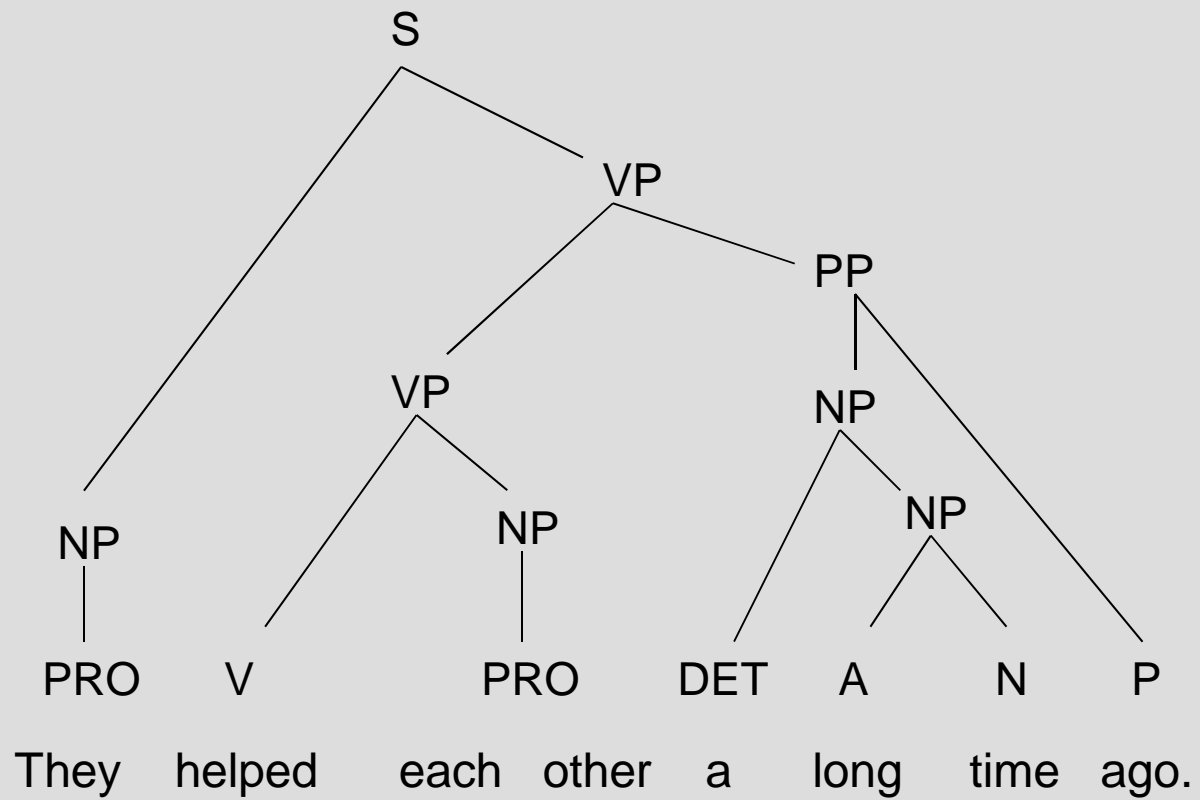
