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Given that English and German are historically closely related, their grammars are surprisingly different. This course takes a close look at the major differences between English and German grammar. Some of the topics discussed in this class include the marking of grammatical relations, tense and aspect, relative clauses, infinitival constructions, word order, word formation, and contrastive phonology. It is the goal of the course to make students aware of the differences between English and German grammar and to introduce them to functional-cognitive explanations in the study of morphosyntax.
